Supernaut (Bruce Hunter).

There's a plot of sorts lurking between the lavers of sound (songs, pipes and percussive instruments) and action. It concerns the romance between Supernaut, an astronaut- cowbov whose white spacesuit has a cowboy hat attached to its air hose, and Comet, who also is desired by the evil Terminus. Supernaut has his own gruesome admirer, Fetid (she drives a hearse for the universe), who will stop at nothing to keep her man.

When a skateboard-riding Comet is turned into a marionette by an admiring Sun (on stilts) and she commands. "Let me go, Hibachi-head!" and the Sun starts moving the Comet and her paramour about on strings yelling, "Walkies!" it's obvious that the creators of this show have been inspired by

many different sources.

Gyl Raby and Kirk Miles have packed the show with a multitude of visual and aural sensations to hold the attention of an audience outdoors, but there's aimost too much to absorb in 45 minutes.
